Program Purpose	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Protect public health and safety of guests and employees of licensed hotels and motels in Arlington County.</li> </ul>		
Program Information	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Public Health is required to inspect and license hotel and other lodging facilities regulated under the Commonwealth of Virginia’s Sanitary Regulations for Hotels (12 VAC 5-431). There is no local Code to regulate hotels.</li> <li>New establishments and changes in ownership require a license to be issued. Licenses do not expire.</li> <li>Facilities regulated by the hotel program include hotels, motels, travel lodges, tourist homes and bed and breakfast facilities and similar facilities that have two or more lodging units maintained for use as sleeping areas for temporary occupancy.</li> <li>Note: AirBNB rooms are not regulated by the hotel program. Therefore, we do not have the authority to inspect them.</li> <li>Environmental Health inspects hotels annually and as needed to respond to concerns/outbreaks.</li> <li>Inspections of hotels are limited to the sanitation of the facility, linens, general housekeeping, maintenance and vector control.</li> <li>Restaurants and/or pools that are part of a hotel are licensed and regulated separately as per the Food and Food Handling and the Water Recreation Facilities Codes.</li> <li>Annual inspections are conducted on a percentage of the County’s 9000+ rooms on different floors and room types based on hotel size (typically ten rooms per establishment).</li> <li>Staff conduct plan review for any new or remodeled hotel.</li> </ul>		
Service Delivery Model	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>FY 2021 a sample of hotels were inspected per VDH guidelines. In FY 2022, all hotels were inspected.</li> </ul>

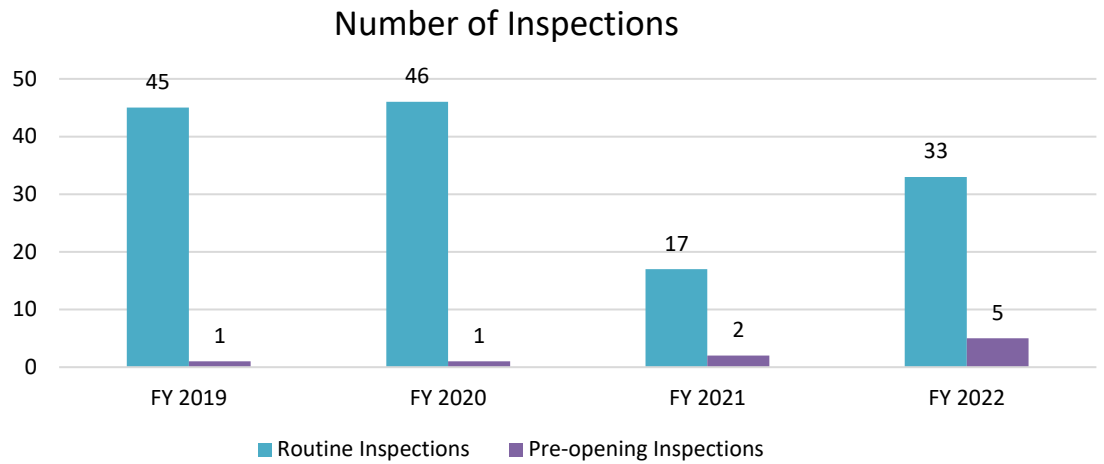

Data Summary

- Annual inspections are conducted on a percentage of the County’s 9000+ rooms on different floors and room types based on hotel size (typically ten rooms per establishment).
- Hotels receive a pre-opening inspection when there is a change of ownership.
- Hotels with 300+ rooms or event spaces were inspected and prioritized for FY 2021.

**What is the story behind the data?**

- The hotel industry was negatively impacted by the pandemic. Tourism appears to be returning to pre-pandemic levels.

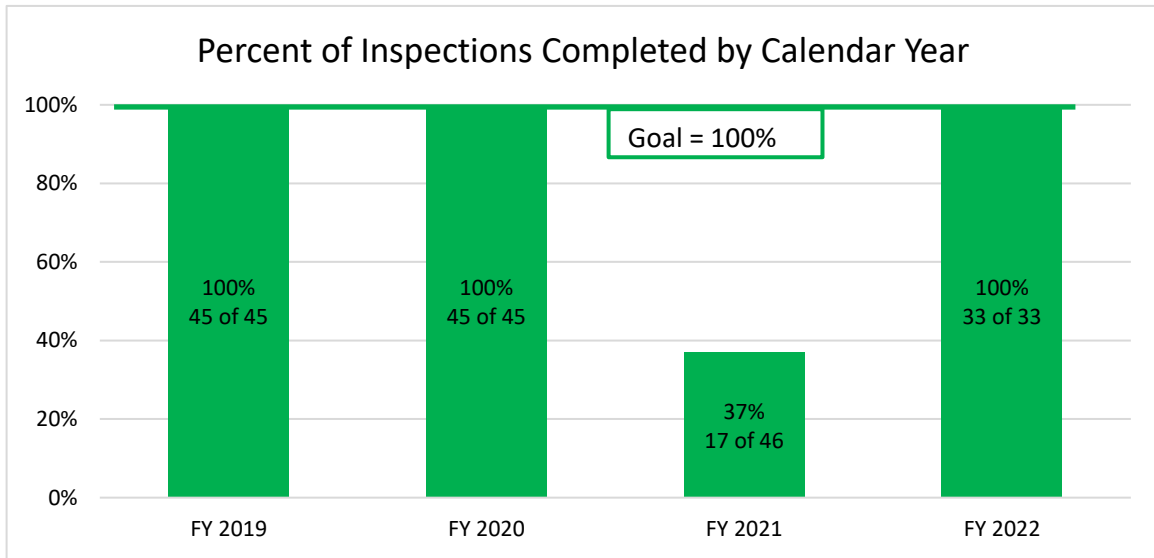

**Data Summary**

- Data for inspections is pulled from the statewide data system and reconciled with the assignment list to determine whether establishments received the required routine inspection. Newly opened hotels are excluded from this measure.

**What is the story behind the data?**

- All hotels with 300+ rooms were considered high priority and inspected in January 2021. Hotels with slightly less than 300 rooms and/or event space were also inspected.
- In FY 2022, all licensed hotels were inspected.
- Hotels are licensed and inspected under authority from the Commonwealth of Virginia. The Commonwealth’s standard is to conduct annual random inspections on a percentage of hotels within each locality. Arlington County conducts one routine inspection per hotel each year.
- Environmental Health conducts routine inspections of each hotel in January, shortly after the license for each hotel is renewed.
- Average inspection time is 2 hours.

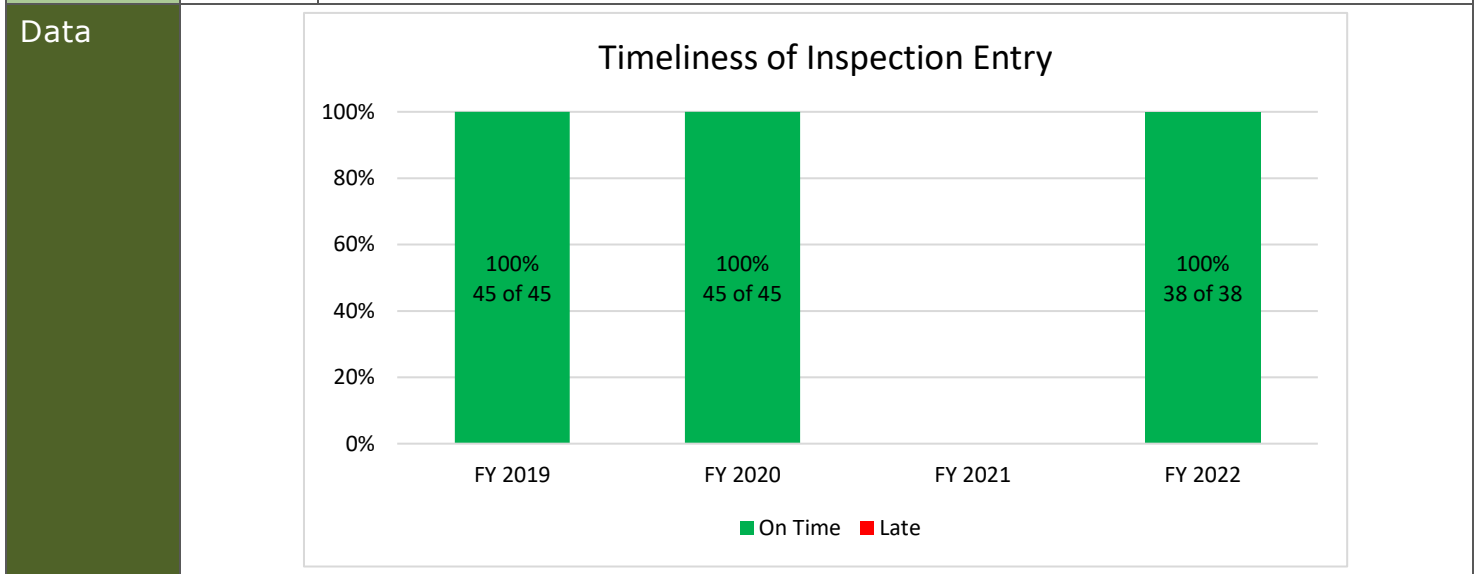

**What is the story behind the data?**

- This measure was not calculated in FY 2021 due to the pandemic and need for Environmental Health staff to be reallocated to support the public health response efforts.
- Inspections are expected to be entered within 2 business days per unit policy.

**What is the story behind the data?**

- An establishment that has a pattern of violations will be brought into Enforcement.
- Enforcement is a multi-step process that includes 1) Notice of Alleged Violation, 2) Fact Finding Conference, 3) Notice of Intent to Revoke, 4) Revocation Hearing, and 5) Revocation
- The enforcement process progresses when the pattern of violations continues.
- Each step affords the owner the opportunity to correct the pattern of violations and to come into compliance.
