SUMMARY OF PRESENTATIONS/DISCUSSIONS

Chair's Introduction and Review/Approval of Meeting Minutes

- *Commission consideration of October 25, 2022 minutes*
- *Motion to approve without any amendments to the draft 10/25 PRC meeting minutes.*

Public Comment

** Park and Recreation Commission public comment is open to all with a 3-minute limit per person.*

- **Public Commenter #1: Elizabeth Warren** commented on tennis ball recycling programs. Tennis courts in 26 different County parks. Balls end up in green spaces and water management areas, and in many times end up in the trash. They take a lot of time to decompose. 125 million tennis balls are thrown away yearly in the USA. "Recycle Balls" is a non-profit that recycles tennis balls for various other uses (playground asphalt, etc.). A person can order a label to ship discarded tennis balls in order to be recycled. Designated recycle bins for tennis balls would be helpful.
 - PRC Chair Kuppa that this item could potentially be an item for future discussion at the SC/PRC joint meeting in February.
 - Playing ethically and environmental awareness at APS sites and at schools (further education on this topic).
 - Upgrading north end of Bluemont Park (tennis facilities), the PSMP speaks to consolidating various sports at central sites. This initiative could be built into the development of the Bluemont facility as a pilot program perhaps.
 - Touch base potentially with DES on these issues.

Presentation and Discussion on the Crystal Plaza 5 Site Plan, Proposed Public Spaces

Public Commenter on this item: Bernard Berne commented on the Crystal Plaza 5 site plan project. The project will contain a large substantial lawn and minimal pollinator areas. Planting areas are needed throughout the spaces (common milkweed, etc.). Too few trees and ornamental areas.

Madhvi Shukla with JBG Smith provided a presentation on the Crystal Plaza 5 site plan project, including updates on the public spaces designed within this area (Crystal City Sector Plan (CCSP) identified areas as Park #10 and #11). JBG Smith is joined by landscape architect (OJB) staff, Andrew Cridlin as well. The presentation focused on the proposed public spaces, its relationship to the CCSP, site layouts, pedestrian circulation, public space character/aesthetics, pedestrian furnishings, among other features. Further discussions were had on what makes up the proposed public spaces (excluding private outdoor café areas), providing for visible/clear signage regarding pet relief areas (potentially provide dog refuse bags, treats, etc.). The width of the east-west connection may be too wide and make it more plant friendly. Provide for sun/shade studies for the public space areas that may include pollinator plants/trees. Include more curvilinear/organic shapes among the spaces and include opportunities for using the topography of the surrounding spaces for additional planting opportunities. Potentially provide greater shade opportunities within Park #10. Inclusion of greater public space areas (Park #10) would be provided in the update to the block plan for this area.

EcoAction Arlington Tree Canopy Equity Presentation and Discussion

DeShay Williams, EcoAction Arlington and PRC Vice Chair, Jill Barker provided a presentation and discussion on the EcoAction Arlington tree canopy equity initiative. Kisha Sogunro was also introduced as EcoAction Arlington's TCEP chair. Discussions involved the importance of tree canopy equity and how environmental degradation disproportionately affects communities of color. The tree equity program pilot was launched in spring 2021 w/ High View Park, Aurora Highlands and Gates of Ballston Apartment communities. Outreach included door-to-door canvassing events and garden parties, which generated greater interest in the program (new applications received for the tree canopy program). Focusing on apartment complexes and other community spaces (places of worship) there are greater opportunities to provide additional tree canopy. Tree Canopy Equity program was launched in May 2022 and targets 10 neighborhoods in particular. Grant funding needs to get spent and spring planting applications are due on January 7, 2023. There is continued work with stormwater management measures that may allow trees planted within this program count as stormwater credit(s). In terms of development proposals, developers often contribute to the Tree Canopy Fund if they cannot plant replacement trees on their respective sites. EcoAction Arlington is a local non-profit which provides work for the County and helps administer how the Tree Canopy Fund is used. There is also a requirement to water the trees within the forestry grant to water trees within a 15-year period.
