Station 10

September 25th, 1921 - June 24th, 1961

Suffered smoke inhalation after leading his crew (Engine 10) to an apartment fire on the fifth floor of the Tyler Building of the Arlington Towers project (River Place) on June 24, 1961. He was transported to Arlington Hospital. He was 39 years old and joined the department in 1944. Married and father of three children. Firefighter Zachary Theodore is his great grandson.

Captain Archie B. Hughes



Station 4

November 25th, 1930 - October 19th, 1964

One of the first to enter a structure fire at 2362 N. Nelson St. he became overcome by smoke and flame as he operated in the attic on October 19th, 1964 at 2364 N. Nelson St. Four other firefighters were injured while operating and trying to rescue him. His nephews, John "Country" Hughes and Steve Hughes are Retired ACFD Firefighters

Lieutenant Elmer Marcey



Station 7

May 20th, 1916 - November 23rd, 1967

While on duty Lt. Marcey was found deceased by his crew in the Watch Office at Fire Station 7.

He was one of the first 18 people hired from the volunteer ranks and assigned to station 3 in Cherrydale.

Firefighter William M. Miller



Station 10

July 25th, 1943 – October 11th, 1982

Firefighter Miller participated in a physical test at Station 9. He returned home and was found deceased in his chair by family.

Volunteer FF Eugene Payne



Station 2

(Ballston VFD)

Birth 1868 – February 15th, 1929

Died from injuries sustained after being struck by an automobile while rolling hose after a fire on Wilson Blvd. in Ballston.

Fellow firefighters lifted the car off of Firefighter Payne, placed him on the fire truck and rushed him to Georgetown Hospital where he latter died.

Volunteer FF Frank Hinkins



Station 6

(Falls Church VFD)

June 24th, 1894 - July 18th, 1934

Died from injuries sustained in an apparatus crash while responding to a false Alarm.

Volunteer FF George Skidmore



Station 2

(Ballston VFD)

November 22nd, 1897 - June 15th, 1943

Died from injuries sustained after an apparatus accident on June 13th, 1943, responding to an emergency. During a severe thunderstorm the apparatus driver hit an oil slick on Wilson Blvd. between Wayne and Veitch.

Skidmore was the BVFD Vice President and 14 year member.
