Thank you for watching the video presentation on the final draft concept for the Walter Reed Outdoor Pickleball project. Please use the space below to share any thoughts to help inform final updates to the draft design.

As this project moves forward I hope the county will continue to preserve the basketball courts for basketball only. One observation as a resident who lives nearby on Walter Reed (and who also plays pickleball and uses the quiet open space of the park) is the high percentage of pickleball players who drive to play on the courts, rather than walking or taking public transit. Often this also includes drivers/players backing their vehicles up to the court fences and "tailgating" with engines running and doors open and stereos playing outside the courts while they wait to play. this is especially common for the pickleball currently played on the basketball courts due to the positioning of the parking spaces so close to the court with only a sidewalk separation. The sidewalk obviously can't be used by other park and rec center patrons when this happens. It would be helpful for the design to passively or actively discourage players from "tailgating" in this way with idling vehicles, by keeping parking sufficiently spaced from the courts and court entrances and putting at least some vegetation and landscaping (bushes etc) between courts and the closest parking spaces.

No one wants these courts at Walter Reed, even the pickleballers, who will want more courts after this is done. That said, given that you are moving forward even though everything indicates you should not, you should:

- Use the same hours of the community center + give the neighborhood a couple of days off every week.
- Use automated locks on the gates
- Make all pickleball courts around the county either reservation only or drop in only.
- Distribute demand by striping more courts around the county
- Construct only 4 courts at WRCC same as most of the other locations
- Use better sound mitigation than acoustical fencing let's be honest, it barely does anything except reflect the sound

This entire process has been ridiculous from the start. You've ignored sound science about the impact of pickleball as well as on the use of the community center. Nice to know that the county cares about its residents.

Limit hours of play to this of the community center, and close the courts entirely for 1-2 days / week

Stripe many more courts around the county and make them all drop in play, or alternatively, make Walter Reed reservation only as well.

Build serious sound mitigation measures - "acoustifence" just doesn't hack it. Spend the money needed to make a real effort.

Engage a professional firm that has designed other pickleball courts in a way to maximize mitigation on the neighborhood.

Ridiculous that you're building this facility in literally the worst place given the impact of pickleball on the neighborhood and using Arlington County tax dollars to fund courts that are heavily used by folks from outside of the county - from other parts of VA, from DC, and from MD - I've seen the license plates during pickleball hours. Seems like Arlington County cares more about people playing a game than the mental health and well being of its residents. I guess this really is the Arlington Way now.

It's really hard to believe that you're proceeding with this project at Walter Reed given the impact on the use of the community center, the impact that this design will have on the parks ability to be used for other purposes, and the noise impact on the surrounding neighborhood. No one appears to want these courts at Walter Reed, even the pickleballers, who will continue to want more courts after you build this facility. This is a ridiculous waste of public funds and this will not solve the problem, while simultaneously creating a number of issues at/around Walter Reed that didn't exist previously. That said, given that you are proceeding despite all evidence that indicates you should not, I suggest that you:

- Operation of the permanent facility should mirror the hours of the community center, plus you should give the neighborhood a couple of days off from play entirely. Please put automated locks on the gates so that neighbors don't need to continuously call police in order to get people to leave during off hours.
- Pay for more and better sound mitigation. Submerge the courts by a few feet at least and put up thick, sound absorbing walls around the courts. The fencing you're using now just creates an echo chamber that even the pickleball players complain about.
- Make all pickleball courts either reservation only or drop in only. Unfair to limit drop in play to WRCC which results in large numbers of people (as many as nearly 60 at times) lined up to play.
- Stripe more courts around the county. Distribute play by providing greater supply of courts.
- Build only four (4) courts so that this site is no more attractive to players than the others. Having 6 with drop in play will continue to attract most of the players from the county and beyond.

As a resident of16th St. S., a pickleball and tennis player, an involved participant of the 55+ community at WR, and someone who walks and bicycles often in the neighborhood, I have grown tired of many of my neighbors adamant criticism and unreasonable demands (reservation only use, etc.) regarding the pickleball courts. I am saddened to hear so many unfounded NIMBY complaints. Noise mitigation is important to me; so is having vibrant, well-used public spaces and parks. I like the healthy, new energy infused so close to my home by the uptick in pickleball over the last several years; and would like to see the west basketball courts remain available for pickleball play during school hours. I hope this is a possibility. Also, will there be any option to play tennis at WR? Thank you for all you are doing to thoughtfully consider both residents' and players' needs/wants. I am looking forward to the completed project.

We need MORE pickleball courts. Not LESS. I already wait an hour to play. This will kill the sport. Where did that pickleball budget we passed go?

This doesn't seem to do anything to mitigate the annoying noise of the very loud sport. There is also a lack of parking.

All courts across the county should either be reservation only (almost all other courts) or drop in only (can play without a reservation). Limiting drop-in play to WRCC continues to drive players to that facility as they prefer not to make reservations; as such, at times there are 40-50 people lined up to play on these courts.

Walter Reed is a COMPLETELY INAPPROPRIATE location for a pickleball facility due to its proximity to nearby residences, its negative impact on the mental, physical, and emotional health of the people who live nearby, and the visual blight of sound barriers blocking views of this pretty pocket park. If the County is going to proceed with this HIGHLY ILL-ADVISED AND HARMFUL project that COMPLETELY DISREGARDS the health of nearby residents: 1) there should be AT LEAST one weekend day when no pickleball is allowed and preferably 2-3 days per week where play is not allowed (i.e., the County should stand by its promise to spread pickleball play fairly around the County), 2) play should only be allowed AT MOST during operating hours of the community center and preferably less, 2) the doors to the courts should lock automatically so that play cannot continue beyond allowed hours, 3) any sound barriers should *completely* surround the courts and *be at least two stories high* to provide a barrier of sound going to higher floors of nearby residences, 4) all court lighting should be placed low to the courts and face inward, 5) trash and bathroom facilities must be plentiful and serviced daily (if the County can't commit to this, it's another reason not to have a pickleball facility there), 6) a sign should be placed on any basketball court entrance stating that no pickleball play is allowed there, and 7) the courts should be striped for tennis so that tennis players who wish to use the courts can do so.

In addition to the above concerns, it is very disappointing that the County is proceeding with this project and investing upwards of \$1 million before any County-wide sports facility study is done. The County is proceeding in a vacuum of evidence-based analysis and planning, including the health effects of pickleball on nearby residents. For what it's worth, I don't live within hearing distance of the courts myself; I am simply a concerned citizen.

6 courts is simply not enough. Getting rid of the PB courts on the basketball court will increase wait times to get on the court. Nix the basketball court put dedicated PB courts there too, with lights.

6 connected courts would be better for drop-in play and to support social and community aspects of the sport.

Going from 9 courts to 6 makes no sense, the demand for residents who show up and play pickleball is much higher and more consistent that that of the basketball demand on the outdoor courts. Keep the PB courts on the basketball pad for sure and renovate the surface for both sports during this larger renovation.

While under construction, the county should provide an alternative drop-in site with 6-9 courts to accommodate the residents who usually play at Walter Reed.

Hello! I live right across from the Walter Reed Community Center along Walter Reed Drive, and I frequently walk through the open field area and around the courts as I go for walks.

While not pretty, the temporary sound barriers really seem to have helped with noise! If more sightly, permanent ones are put in place—and maybe if some tall bushes are also planted around the outside?—I think that would amply take care of the noise problem.

I've lived in our house since 1997, when the baseball diamond was still there, and have already seen the open space narrow to make room for the basketball court. I understand that the proposed design would simply reshape the open space, but I would prefer this not happen, for a few reasons:

- Nostalgia (I'm pretty fond of our little park the way it is, current shape and size and trees and all)
- The current shape of the park allows for 1) a more open feeling, 2) room to share space with a wide view of others also in the space and with few view obstructions (which seems to me nicer-looking and also potentially safer... I'm a woman and frequent walker—I've seen too many local crime reports lately, and I like the current visibility of that section!) and 3) a more uninterrupted view of nature (as opposed to having the courts running all the way along the parking lot, extending the visual real estate of the courts from both the Walter Reed and 16th St. points of view).
- Not wanting construction going on across our street or having activities/paths/leisure activities interrupted during construction (I understand the sacrifice would be temporary but am not convinced enough of the change being an improvement)

While WR is being renovated we will need more courts designated for drop-in play for convenience and for social activity. It also makes no sense to drop the number of courts at WR from 9 to 6.

There are many reasons why Pickleball is the fastest growing sport in America. Seemingly overlooked here is the need for masses of courts in order to best cater to the amazing "drop-in" quality of the sport which differentiates it from any other. Twosies and threesies don't cut it. Nine plus is a decent start.

Why doesn't Arlington get this?

Reducing our court presence here from 9 to 6 with 30% growth in the sport is a travesty to the beauty and value of this game.

There is no compelling reason for eliminating the three lined courts on the basketball pad. These are amongst the most used courts in America. Contrary to rumors, we are completely able to share these courts with basketball players.

My strongest suspicion is that if this policy of de-lining those courts happens, this valuable resource will be dramatically vacant until late afternoon which is when basketball players will generally play. The amount of joy, exercise and social function that these courts provide will be lost to great shame.

Please visit these courts on nearly any morning. See the magic. Please reconsider.

I support the increased distance between the nearest residences on 16th Street south and the proposed pickleball courts, because it meets the distance minimums recommended in the Centennial, CO study. I also support increasing the number pickleball opportunities County wide, as well plans to increase parking capacity. What is needed at this point is a more effective sound abatement structure than the current one. While decibel readings taken by DPR indicate lower pickleball volume at ground level, the existing "Acoustifence" actually deflects noise into the 2nd stories of the 16th Street South homes. Additionally, limiting days of pickleball play to the weekdays, the permitted hours of play between 9AM and 7PM, and to permit play by appointment only, as long as the existing Acoustifence remains. Also greater crowd management and sanitation measures must be in place to handle increased activity.

Nice job incorporating everyone's ideas while balancing competing interests. We're coming down the home stretch and need a few refinements to make this a safe, first-class facility.

- 1. More shade Add a roof/shade structure to every court as you have done to the two center courts
- 2. More space between a court sideline and an interior fence Increase distance from 5.5 to 7 feet. This slight increase will make a HUGE difference to competitive players.
- 3. Surround each court TOTALLY with a fence and its own gate entrance. This has a number of important benefits: it prevents balls from leaving the court area, it prevents balls from going on another court which, in turn eliminates the distraction of having others interrupt your game to retrieve their ball.
- 4. Consider the leaves and provide leaf gates, as you've done at Hayes Park.
- 5. Access to bathrooms and water fountains. I know this exists when the community center is open, how about when Walter Reed is closed? THAN'K YOU for the opportunity to contribute and for all your work on this project. NICE JOB!

All courts across the county should be either reservation only or drop in only. Limiting drop-in play to Walter Reed Community Center drives players to this facility and as a result, at times there are too many people lined up to play. Continue to stripe more pickleball courts around the county. It is inequitable to have Walter Reed Community Center be the main place for "pickleball central". The county needs to distribute demand by adding more pickleball courts county-wide to divert demand from this single, primary location. The residential neighborhood around Walter Reed Community Center should not bear the burden of increased traffic and noise for the entire county.

I am a Walter Reed Community center resident and live across the street from the tennis courts. I strongly disagree with the incessant promotion of pickleball courts in the WRCC facilities. I am writing this comment to implore the county to limit hours of pickleball play in our courts and set grounded rules on who can play and when. Additionally please give the residents and kids like me some days off pickleball play entirely. Sometimes people might just want to play a game of basketball across the street when it's NOT dark or some tennis. Or maybe just a break from the noise and people. Oh let us not forget the unfinished noise cancelation panels around the tennis court. It's just an ugly, black, inefficient, expensive, weird, eyesore! Like come on you probably spend a bunch of money on that then didn't finish or make it look good and it doesn't even really work. Lastly, let's highlight the fact that the vast majority of outdoor pickleball facilities are right here at WRCC. Like there are plenty other communities around the county to spread these out. Why do the residents have to pay and get their street parking taken by these pickle ballers every single day. There are like nine courts here. Please, spread, them, out! 90 percent of the time when I want to go out and play basketball or tennis outside guess who's there, pickleballers! So, as I conclude, please don't go about building more stuff here and make this community a more sport and people equitable and friendly place. Please. Stop. This.

- 1. Love that the walkways will be handicapped accessible. Is DPR trying to attract wheelchair pickleball players? If so, the proposed playing areas are too small for wheelchair play. The recommended total playing area for wheelchair play is 44' x 74'. I've been told that recreational wheelchair players can play in a 34' x 64' playing area. I would love to see people in wheelchairs playing pickleball in Arlington. FYI, the National Senior Games has added hybrid pickleball (wheelchair pickleball) as a sport at their 2025 event.
- 2. The current concept drawings show 7' from the sidelines to the perimeter fence. That's great!

 The drawing shows only 5.5' from the sidelines to the interior fences. USAP recommends a playing area of 34' x 64' for new construction. Please consider enlarging the playing area so that all fences are 7' from a sideline. If my math is correct, that would mean adding 3 more feet to the proposed footprint for each cluster of courts. It's no fun crashing into a fence!
- 3. Please install a fence around each court and add a gate entrance to each court rather than leaving large open spaces between the baseline and sideline fences. The purpose of a fence is to keep balls on their proper court. The openings in the fences in the current design will ensure that balls leave the court and may be a safety hazard to unsuspecting spectators outside the fence. That design will be disastrous when Enjoy Arlington pickleball classes (6 students per court) are taught on those courts. Coaches may use up to 40 pickleballs during a class. Many of those balls would end up outside the court using the current design. Adding a gate entrance to each court will also eliminate distractions from people walking to other courts.
- 4. Consider adding leaf gates to the design. It looks like there will be debris from nearby trees that will need to be cleared periodically.
- 5. I am a sports management/recreational professional. I love seeing people use public recreational space. Removing the pickleball lines on the basketball court at Walter Reed will mean that space is not used by anyone most of the day. Full court basketball is never played there people go there to shoot baskets. No basketball players use that space during morning hours (kids are in school and most adults are working). Please reconsider the recommendation to remove the pickleball lines. The current designated hours for pickleball is working and supports an amazing community of players. The vast majority of pickleball players adhere to those hours of play.
- 6. Please advise about access to bathrooms and a water fountain.
- 7. Please advise about the plans for lights at the courts.
- 8. When the new courts are available, please restore the hours of play on weekends and holidays. I assume the courts will not need to be locked and the hours of play will no longer need to be aligned with the hours of operation for the WR Community Center.

Thank you for all your work and for your consideration.

This plan is an improvement, but not perfect. Please continue to consider the ongoing inconvenience to the residents in the closest proximity to the community center and that this site is indeed a COMMUNITY CENTER, it should NOT be a dedicated pickle ball facility. It needs to have amenities for ALL members of the community, not just one subset.

I'm disappointed to see that all tennis courts are taken away, you should leave at least 1-2 dedicated tennis courts.

Please confirm that the basketball court will NOT be available for pickleball even without striping the court.

It would be best if the County will limit hours of play to coincide with the community center operating hours.

Please also confirm no pickle ball will be available on all election days so parking is available for voters.

Please continue the noise mitigation measures and studies in partnership with the residents who are most impacted along 16th St S. Visit with them during peak play hours and witness their experience.

Please continue to stripe other tennis courts across the county to provide more areas to play, so players aren't all using this site. Please limit drop in hours and encourage reservation only.

Please consider parking constraints for Saturday morning youth basketball leagues and other indoor programs and limit pickleball play during those peak times.

Flesh out the noise mitigation solutions - if the county is assuming that they'll 'eventually' receive written/verbal feedback after the project has been completed, this will cause bigger problems down the road. Many members of the Walter Reed Community are minorities/ESL, who are not accustomed to providing feedback online and will get the short end of the stick as they will feel unheard and helpless. Additionally, if the county considers the fact that the minority population in Walter Reed does not play pickleball, it would be in the county's best interest to create more pickleball facilities in northern neighborhoods so that the Walter Reed center isn't overcrowded/inaccessible to this community.

The concept is very disappointing. It seems by trying to meet all needs, it doesn't meet any. It shows no or at least little understanding of senior pickleball at Walter Reed, or any where. Why is pickleball popular with the seniors? Walter Reed's current community reflects the welcoming, supportive, engaging activity that pickleball has become known for. Your video did give voice to the health and social benefits of pickleball, yet your plan will destroy the community at Walter Reed in many ways. All the top themes from comments on your project seemed to be ignored. First there are fewer courts. Competitive and often younger players now play on the basketball courts. By removing them from play, those players will intimidate seniors as they move their play to the area of the six courts. Socially they want to play more competitively with those on their level. The present group has a reputation of welcoming all levels of play, including working with beginners. The hair brain idea of separating the six courts will dramatically cut the socialization which currently happens.

When the health of seniors is given importance, how can you even draft a concept which would negatively affect the seniors getting out, getting active, and actively being a part of a vital community.

"LET IT BE KNOWN HENCEFORTH THAT ANY PICKLEBALL COMMUNITY THAT IS WELCOMING AND ACCESSIBLE IS AN ABOMINATION AND SHALL BE DISPERSED".

Instead of spending tons of dollars on moving courts and - by the way - reducing the number of courts, why not just increase the sound proofing and repair the courts that are already there. There are more and more people playing pickleball and Arlington is reducing the courts at WR. Why, when the bball courts are rarely used during the day, can't the courts stay there?

County Board member Tannia Talento's emphasis on the importance of reviewing the current program at the Walter Reed Community Center, particularly about the impact of pickleball, is a valid concern. It's crucial for Arlington County to support and prioritize accessible voting locations to encourage maximum civic participation.

Moving out the Tennis is an issue:

Tennis is the perfect social-distancing sport—and the numbers continue to prove it.

Tennis participation in the U.S. increased by 22% in 2020, with 21.64 million people hitting the courts, according to recent data from the Physical Activity Council's Participation (PAC) report produced by Sports Marketing Surveys. The survey and report monitor more than 120 different sports and activities participated in by Americans.

Of the more than 21 million Americans saying they played tennis last year, 6.78 million were either new or returning/lapsed players. Nearly 3 million of those were first-time players, a 44% increase over new players in 2019. Additionally, the 3.82 million Americans who returned to the sport after time away was a 40% increase over the same measure in 2019. one month ago

I don't understand why Arlington is spending all this money to reduce what it provides to the community. No one plays basketball. But even if they did, it's a fraction of the number of people who want to play pickle ball. Why don't you make a small court for basketball and still retain the 9 quarts for Pickleball. Even having 9 courts isn't enough to meet the demand. Are those making the decision counting the sheer numbers from the community who are now thriving at this facility? You could save a lot of money and maximize use by just keeping it the way it is resurfacing the courts and putting up a giant wall with a big beautiful mural to reduce the noise. No one is ever ever ever there playing basketball. Even when the restrictions on pickleball are on. It just sits empty. Such a waste. Please reconsider what you are about to do.

You clearly know nothing about Open Play in Pickleball: there is essentially ONE line of players to use the courts; after players finish their ONE game and leave the court, the next four in line play...having the six courts separated is WEIRD.

It should go without saying that a city/town/county the size of Arlington needs MORE dedicated courts; there is room for at least 9 courts in the area. I've played in several different states .. and no one has a "waiting area" -- once again, this seems like an idea from someone who doesn't know pickleball.

This is a waste of taxpayers' money when other cities such as Washington DC are drawing in businesses to provide spaces for the Pickleball players (commercial, not municipal funds are used to provide space) and their local players. Why aren't we soliciting retail providers for the sport like DC while we have a short fall of commercial real estate tax proceeds? My understanding is that Arlington wants to tax its residence more to make up for the shortfall instead of looking for new industry to compensate for the shortfall. Instead you're having Arlington county taxpayers foot the bill and forgo using these proceeds to improve other services for actual taxpayers in the community. Your plan also results in destroying old trees, such as the beautiful magnolia tree and the green space area to put slabs of concrete down for a fad sport that earns no revenue for the county.

Many of the players that currently come out here take away parking from residence in the local area and they leave litter on the ground from food and other things which also attracts rodents and many are not even Virginia residents. Independent analysis should be conducted.

It's convenient to have the same people who installed the rubber mats on the fence also test the decibels for comparison. I'm sure the product works real great while my own ears hear the sounds very well spilling out of the sides of the current tennis court area. Additionally, there is very little parking. No consideration has been taken for those people using the community center for other services, such as the elderly during the day who play other sports at the community center, etc. the addition of courts with only four parking spaces is absolutely ridiculous. If you want to put the pickle ball players somewhere and make no money on it, it should be in a field somewhere away from all other houses with ample parking. Finally, it is ridiculous that you aren't weighing the views of people who live here more heavily than that of those people living 10 miles away (that's Maryland and DC) by the way!

6 pickleball courts are not enough. Most of the primetime hours, Arlington county allows reservation to 2 courts for pickleball classess, that will leave only 4 courts to play for 100+ players.

I play pickleball 3-4 days per week at Walter Reed in the mornings during the week. I also play on occasion at lubber Run and Arlington Mill.

Spending a lot of money to delete 1/3 of the courts at Walter Reed makes no sense. Why not leave the courts on the basketball court? It doesn't cost anything and accommodates a large number of people. At least allow pickleball play there during the day during the week.

Putting the pickleball courts side by side is ok, but separating them with a sitting area between them with separate paddle racks is contrary to the "drop in" style of play in pickleball. By separating them, you are really creating two distinct play areas where one is more conducive to play and the most efficient in reducing wait times. It's like having separate lines that serve tellers/cashiers at the bank/grocery store rather one line that feeds into the next available window.

I am not in agreement with proposal. The sport is growing therefore there the demand keeps increasing. Why decrease the number of courts from 9 to 6? If it cannot be increased, definitely it should not be deceased. Please keep the 9 courts including using the basketball court at least on weekends when the demand is higher.

Also, having the 6 courts separated is disruptive. Since the game is players "drop-in", 6 continuous/connected courts are needed for quicker playing and substitution of players. Finally, it is imperative that the county provides 9 alternative courts while Walter Reed is under construction.

Please take into consideration keeping 9 courts. This is a very social and fun sports that attracts players of all ages and whole families together. As the sport continues to growth, there will be a needed for additional courts. Why decrease the amount now when all the 9 courts are being used?

You've cut the existing pickleball capacity by one-third when the demand for the sport continues to grow rapidly. If you are bent on keeping dedicated basketball space for a seniors community (and younger users who are almost always going to be late afternoon or evening), then at least remove the "courtyard view" (which supplies a view of just part of 2 courts not covered by the noise barriers) to make a seventh court. The "view" meets no real need, is severely limited, and consumes needed compensatory space (obviously not making up for all 3 lost courts in your design, but reducing the damage by 1). Finally, why have you not at least explained how Bluemont is used (e.g., some real data on intensity of use) and why it could not be converted to either a dual use facility, or even a dedicated pickleball facility, given (a) the ample availability of other tennis court space in the County, and (b) the different culture of play (essentially reserved vs open and therefore constantly changing player culture)?

The concept looks great, with a lot of thought going into it. I support the preservation of existing trees in the construction. Also, keeping potentially tall trees away from the courts is a good idea, since it will mitigate leaves and other material from falling on the court and allow for faster court drying after rains. Finally, on the sides of the courts facing the houses, I would focus on two layers of lower profile, well foliated shrubs and/or small trees. This should help with noise mitigation.

The salient feature of the plan seems to be a 33 percent reduction in courts at Walter reed. The demand for courts is there, particularly the inclusive organized system at Walter reed, and the county is giving classes to teach more people the sport. Why reduce capacity?

one month ago

We need pickleball and with clear hours we can satisfy all groups. We have many people who want to play all sports and we should adjust with all the space the opportunity for all to play their respective sport.

I am a resident of Arlington Village, a community adjacent to the Walter Reed Community Center. Although my condominium is far enough away from WRCC that I don't hear pickleball noise I am concerned about the well-being of my neighbors who live along 16th St. S. across from the pickleball courts. As such I offer the following comments to address their concerns about the Pickleball Projects.

- 1. Continue to limit the hours of operation of the permanent facility to those (AT MOST) of the community center. Play is already allowed for ~ 80 hours/week and a report presented to the county board by DPR on 4/25 made it clear that limiting hours and locking the courts was part of its efforts to "find solutions that are measured and responsive to the community's needs" and that the intent was to "Reduce impact of intense play on neighbors."
- 2. Give WRCC some days/nights off from pickleball play at WRCC entirely this would be appropriate and would make this somewhat more palatable.
- 3. ALL courts across the county should either be reservation only (almost all other courts) or drop-in only (can play without a reservation). Limiting drop-in play to WRCC continues to drive players to that facility as they prefer not to make reservations; as such, at times there are 40-50 people lined up to play on these courts.
- 4. Implement improved noise mitigation solutions if the county is going to spend well in excess of \$1 million on these courts, they should build more appropriate, free-standing, sound absorbing walls in order to give nearby residents at least some relief.
- 5. Continue to stripe more courts around the county at present, WRCC continues to be "pickleball central" and this is inequitable. The county needs to distribute demand by adding more courts in order to divert demand from this single, primary location.

- limit the hours of the permanent courts to those of the community center.
- provide neighbors with some relief by having some days/nights off from pickleball play at WRCC entirely
- stop this nonsense that some courts are reservation only and some are drop in. All courts should be all drop in or all reservation only.
- build more appropriate sounds absorbing walls than your currently have. acoustic "fencing" isn't doing the job.
- stripe more courts around the county no reason for 40-60 people to be stacked up to play at WRCC on afternoons / evenings. Not fair to other users of the community center or neighbors. Take this issue seriously and build significantly more courts around the county so that play is spread out.

The #1 attraction of Walter Reed is play capacity in a single location. It has generated something that simply won't be replicated elsewhere in Arlington.

#2 Incorporate a Capital Bike share Station as well as bike and scooter parking. EV charging facilities might also be considered. Quite a few people get to the courts via means other than internal combustion vehicles. It would be great to encourage more of that.

You need to limit the time and hours of play and consider repurposing indoor spaces like abandoned strip malls and office building one month ago
Would like to see pickleball on the basketball courts one month ago
This is not an appropriate place for so much pickleball. one month ago

I like the new design from many of the benefits outlined in the video; however since there is a net reduction of capacity, I feel like it is imperative to continue to allow Pickleball play on the basketball court with a shared schedule. one month ago

Public involvement in Arlington County is severely lacking. I participated in some of your sessions at the Walter Reed CC and was embarrassed that you considered that public engagement. Given that you are proceeding despite real opposition from the actual residents of the neighborhood, I suggest that you:

- 1. Limit the hours of operation of the permanent facility to those of the community center (and even a bit less would be better) and further give 1-2 days/nights off from play so that people can enjoy their homes.
- 2. Make all pickleball courts either reservation only or drop in only. Unfair to limit drop in play to WRCC and have 50+ people stacked up at the site at peak times.
- 3. Spend real money on noise mitigation. The fencing you have now is ludicrous and only makes the noise worse in a number of ways. Pay for real sound mitigation designed by engineers who really understand pickleball noise and how to address it.
- 4. Build significantly more courts around the county unfair to residents that most play from across the entire county (and from folks coming from surrounding areas) occurs at this one location. Distribute demand by building more courts across the county.
- 5. Reduce the number of courts down from 6. That's too many at one location given the noise being generated.

I live several blocks away on 19th Street and can still hear the pops from pickleball. Seems like what I am experiencing is not in alignment with your sound checks. Seems disingenuous to make updates to please a small number of pickleball players. Would like to see the costs associated passed on to players and not taken on by the community as a whole.

Feel that the concern over reducing courts from 9 to 6 was largely ignored, users fall into two distinct levels of play. Overall, the expensive cost differential between Option 1 and 2 was not adequately addressed. The existing stormwater treatment was a requirement for the WR Comm Center rebuild project and the new court/seating runoff needs to be addressed independently for capacity and flow (not just run onto field). Elevations not provided for review, and sound reverberation from new elevated court will be louder than the existing dual use BB court play. Pls address extreme loss of existing mature trees and the impact of construction on their roots adjacent to parking area. Feel my taxpayer \$\$'s would be much better spent on resurfacing existing courts; improving acoustical fence; and even improving acoustics at neighboring residences with a window/insulation credit.

Hoping that with the noise reduction measures that hours of play will return to early morning availability (~6:30 to 7am opening). We're not all retirees who play. The restrictions on play hours has eliminated opportunities for full-time workers. Design otherwise looks great!

I really dislike this concept because it does not take into account the way drop in pickleball works. It is also problematic that the courts that are currently on the basketball courts will no longer be there. This is all about caving to the few neighbors who complain about noise. There were no neighbors complaining about any noise on the basketball court. And there is no basketball play during weekday mornings so the court is wasted. DPR had promised to replace the six quarts on the tennis courts with eight pickleball courts. Now instead of the current nine pickleball courts, we will be left with six. DPR does not care about the camaraderie and close ties that have built up among the people who currently play on the tennis courts. All they want is to disseminate us among all the other courts in Arlington so that they can stop hearing complaints from the few neighbors who have complained about the noise.

I realize Arlington County Government is pressuring DPR to increase capacity for playing pickleball. However, in the history of mankind, no mania (currently pickleball) has persisted forever. For at least three reasons, please as numerous commenters have urged soberly decide to retain the courts' dual capacity (for playing both tennis and pickleball): retains flexibility for when the pickleball craze subsides; provides approximately the same (possibly more) capacity for pickleball compared to converting the three tennis courts into dedicated pickleball courts; appeases the neighbors of WRCC who keep urging the County not to create a dedicated pickleball facility at WRCC.

As a neighbor who will be impacted by this design as it brings the courts closer to my house on Walter Reed, I would like to bring up my consistent concerns about hours, traffic, parking, and trash. First, I am hoping that the current hours will not increase after this project is completed. The hour reduction had the greatest effect on noise reduction. I walked to the rec center to vote in November and noticed no parking. Could we please shut down pickleball on Election Day? Could we reduce the speed limit on Walter Reed and make every crosswalk a light up crosswalk? I observe the players, and they all drive. It's not just a sound issue but also impacting the safety of residents who walk around the neighborhood. Pickleball players drive and tailgate at the park for hours. The players typically back their cars into parking spaces with their tailgates up with tents which blocks the sidewalk along the basketball court. Finally, pickleball players increase the amount of trash left at the park. This is not specific to trash that does not make it to cans and is left in the grass, but also comes in the form of objects they leave behind for the their own use. As of 7:58AM on 12/1, there are 2 plastic chairs sitting on the basketball court, and 12 chairs plus a rolling cart on the tennis courts. At any time could these items be disposed of? Lastly, this is the 3rd time I've received an email update on this project from the county sharing upcoming dates for meetings that have already happened. Please try to ensure that email announcements are sent out prior to meeting dates. I would like to see demographics about who plays pickleball at the courts compared to the demographics and interests of the community around the Walter Reed center.

The footprint is still to big. The courts do not need to have 10.0' of space North and South of the playing area. Please try to minimize the area.

You need to wrap the entire courts with sound abatement material. The courts need to be locked. Seating should be moved to the south/other side.

This is a sound abatement measure. Seating and benches for the courts must also be placed on the south side so when the pickle bros are yelling and cursing it will be muted by the parking lot. This is a sound abatement measure. A sign with court hours shall be placed at the entryway to all pickleball courts. This is a sound abatement measure. Hours shall remain as they currently are which give homeowners, residents, and community center visitors respite and ensures players have access to restrooms. This is a sound abatement and public heath measure. A sign shall be placed on the basketball court saying at no time is pickleball allowed EVEN if the basketball court is empty. Neighbors have no problem enforcing this via the rover, My Arlington app, and visits to the community center. Our kids deserve to have their space back! Multiple trash cans shall be placed directly near the courts and cleaned immediately when full. The country cannot allow a surge in players without committing the proper resources. This is a pest prevention measure. All LED court lighting shall be placed low to the courts (as proposed its too high and will cause light pollution) and shall only face inward as not to disturb neighbors. Had the county actually engaged with the neighbors you would have heard the need for shade and benches along 16th St South for our children's bus stop. If you're going to force this on our community, at least be respectful of how our children also use this space.

I really like this design, especially the deck area in the middle with existing trees. But this seems like a lot of work for no gain in quantity of courts. Technically, 2 courts are lost since the basketball court will lose its striping.

Why is there only one canopy over the center court waiting area at each set of courts? I think there should be shade structure at all 6 court waiting areas.

Providing comments is welcomed, however, the draft concept shows a lack of understanding of the nature of PB and a concomitant profound empathy with the community that keeps complaining about PB as a sport. Over the years, DPR's approach of choice is to appease the squeaky wheels, those Arlingtonians whose voices carry the farthest, either because they complain the most or because they are savvy and well-connected. The impromptu response to the complaints @Old Glebe is an example of the latter. The concept for WRCC is an example of the former.

My overall suggestion is to not move forward with any changes @WRCC until the county-wide review of all open spaces is completed. We should conserve our funds until such time as we have a good understanding and strategy about the changing exercise and outdoor needs of our communities. Should you elect to do that, perhaps in the interim you could patch the cracks at the courts (which was done 2 years ago, so maybe choose a different contractor this time, so that our taxes are not wasted...).

If you insist on moving forward with remodeling WR courts, perhaps you could take into account the following:

- -- WR courts no longer function as a beacon for PBers across the metro region. After the strict and sudden imposition of the new hours of operation, people have consistently sought other places to play and to socialize, both in and outside of Arlington. The vibrant PB community @WRCC is no longer, and if DPR believes this is a positive outcome, you are mistaken. We have a significant youthful population, which we ought to nourish instead of placing barriers against their appreciation of our county. We are not Vienna nor should DPR aspire to follow that city's approach to community sports.
- -- We have 9 courts @WRCC right now. The new plan cuts courts by 33% to 6 for reasons that are unclear. Given the scarcity of open spaces in Arlington, DPR should embrace multifunctional courts instead of single sport. Every sports player and fan wants their own turf. But we don't have this luxury this is not Arlington, TX after all. Given the county's commitment to access and equity, "multiuse" should be the norm. The basketball courts are shared between PB and BB, with specific hours for each sport. What are the reasons for reverting the court to only BB? As there is not enough demand for BB throughout the hours of daylight, an obvious conclusion is to drive PB players away from WRCC.
- -- The noise reduction wall has succeeded in significantly reducing the noise affecting the houses across S. 16th Street. Why not embrace this successful solution that has improved the neighbours' quality of life instead of moving forward with a plan that will segregate players and result in fewer people playing @WRCC? It is time to respect the PB community's needs and the increasing number of players drawn to this sport. Even though sports medicine studies on PB (especially on younger populations) are still few, there are enough publications to date that show PB's significant improvements on overall health, mental health and stress, social comport and friendships of middle-aged and older adults. - -- The success of the noise reduction wall begs the question of when will the playing hours be extended? In the summer early morning is crucial to avoid the heat (6-9am). The weekend remains a time when more people are available to play, thus extending the hours of both days is key. Why not have a schedule that reflects not only seasonal and light changes but also attention to players' needs?

It would be nice to keep this layout but have 4 not 6 courts. That way more open free space is preserved. This takes away shady green space. A shame to do all this to appease some complaining neighbors. I would prefer to see more privatization/ indoor facilities for pickleball. Increased tax revenue, occupy empty office space & makes for happy players by having weather friendly options

I do not support the conversion of a LOCAL community center to a REGIONAL pickle ball facility. Pickle ball noise affects all areas of the park, displacing other users who are more likely to be residents of the surrounding neighborhoods.

If Arlington moves forward with these courts, please increase the height of acoustic fencing and install acoustic fencing on ALL sides of the court. The current design has no acoustic fencing along the north side nearest to the Commons of Arlington and the sensory garden.

The neighborhood is totally opposed to adding more pickleball courts at this location. Many of those using the courts live outside Arlington, and threatening Arlington residents with a tax-rate increase while still spending as usual on non-essentials like pickleball courts doesn't lead any reasonable person to conclude that staff is serious about reining in its spending. With all the empty commercial space available in Arlington County, I would think that

utilizing some of it to provide year-round pickleball courts would be a lot more economical and enable greater use (rain or shine). An old Macy's department store location in Richmond, VA, is being converted into pickleball courts — a location that is far less likely to disrupt local neighbors with noise, parking and other problems: https://www.businessinsider.com/pickleball-courts-taking-over-dead-mall-stores-macys-big-box-2023-5?op=1. Austin, TX, is repurposing parking garage space for pickleball courts. And it just so happens that the county's struggling Ballston parking garage has space that could be repurposed for pickleball:

I watched the entire presentation and I understand the concept you all are going for but I think the county is completely out of touch with the pickleball community at large. Pickleball is a pickup community where you can come and put your paddle on the powder rack and find people to play with you, not a reserve a court kind of community. You've already done it wrong with those courts that you have recently lined for pickleball and made them reserved courts because there aren't people out there that always have a partner or a foursome to play. You are forcing people to somehow find others to play with when Arlington is a place where it's hard to meet people.

In this project you are taking away three courts that were previously pickleball courts that a minimal amount of people use for basketball, thus creating less space for pickleball play when it is needed in the area more than basketball. I believe that Arlington county thinks that pickleball is just a trend/fad that is going to go away and it is not. It has been going strong for at least 6 to 7 years now and is only getting bigger by the day.

By shutting down all of Walter Reed for over a year you are also now forcing all of those players to find another place to play for that time period. Upon cutting hours for WR courts, you have forced players to come to Lubber Run where the space is already very congested because there are only four courts that need to be shared by pickleball players and basketball players, when the amount of basketball players is again minimal. At Lubber Run, you could also easily in minimal days repaint the entire area and make this 6 quarts and do away with the basketball courts and give money to the public school across the street to redo their basketball courts of which they have at least six that could use some proper lighting and repaving and be repurposed for the school and the community at certain hours. There is a constant struggle for enough space to play pickleball at Lubber Run and Walter Reed and things are only going to get worse in the year of Walter Reed shutdown because all of the Walter Reed players will be playing at Lubber Run. I don't think that the county is actually thought about this. Keeping the basketball courts open for pickleball play during the construction. Would only make sense to me so that there is some kind of play at the Walter Reed facility and not create overcrowding in other areas of Arlington.

In your project you have a separating courtyard space between the six courts which also makes no sense because again the pickleball community is a drop-in community and now you are going to have more congested quartz and you can only wait for 3 quarts at a time by putting your paddle in one rack

The crucial component in successful pickleball court design is having a large number of courts at one location. This allows the social interaction that is frankly one of the main attractions. It's why Walter Reed with its nine courts is so heavily used, and the couple of courts here and there distributed around the County as not as popular. By cutting down the number of courts at WR from nine to six you dilute the main attraction. Landscape design, shelter design, etc., are but without have no idea of the importance of having a large number of courts at one location. Dear APR,

I am an avid Walter Reed pickleball player and wanted to share my feedback on the proposed redesign project. Based on the redesign, it seems clear that the interest of sound reduction has outweighed the interests of the pickleball community.

Unlike tennis and other sports, pickleball is generally an open play community sport. This means that players come to the courts by themselves, put their paddle on the rack, and start playing with like minded players. For this to work, more courts in the same location encourages more open play and a more vibrant community. While we recognize and appreciate the availability of additional courts striped across the county, a few courts here and there does not support open play.

That's what makes Walter Reed so special. There are currently 9 courts, all of which are actively used during peak hours, and ensure that players have ample opportunity to play. This is in contrast with Lubber Run, who's 4 courts are often overcrowded and much less accessible.

At this point, it seems that the redesign is likely to move forward. To help minimize the impact of the reduction in courts, I suggest the county relocate country-led classes - which take 2 of the courts during peak play hours for much of the year - to courts other than Walter Reed. With all the newly striped courts available across the county, this would go a long way to ensure that the reduced number of courts are fully available to the playing community.

I particularly like the tiered and raised decking, which is a very welcoming signal to player and an acknowledgement of the highly social nature of pickleball itself. I am concerned that the loss of the 3 courts now located on the tennis courts (and informally designated for play by advanced players) will cause the 6 remaining courts to be over-crowded (and sometimes over-crowded with beginner and lower intermediate players that, unfortunately, are sometimes shunned by the advanced players. But that's what drop-in is all about really -- folks having to work it out informally in recreational pickleball. I also appreciate everything the County has done to reduce noise -- I do wonder whether the average 10 dB noise reduction forecast is indeed achievable in practice and I hope that the County will take post-construction noise readings to confirm the effectiveness of noise mitigation.
