






On a scale of 1 to 10, how satisfied are you with the concept?

| Summary ARLINGTON VIRGINIA | One of the most common comments we heard was the desire to install a bubble over the Bluemont tennis courts during winter. Commenters noted that this suggestion aims to maximize the County's investment by enabling yearround use of these facilities, thus serving both the tennis community and the broader County interests. | Another strong theme in the comments involved updating the final design to include practice courts on both sides of the hitting wall. It was noted that this adjustment would enhance training opportunities for users, reflecting a desire for more efficient and versatile use of the available space. | As we heard in the last engagement, there are concerns about the preservation of green spaces and the management of reforested areas. Community feedback encourages the need for consistent and sustainable care of reforested areas that have been impacted by invasive species in the past. | Highlighted again in community feedback, community members living near the facility expressed concerns about noise and light pollution. They advocate for design solutions that minimize disturbances, such as employing sound mitigating materials and configuring lighting to ensure it does not negatively impact local living conditions at night. | Input we heard in previous engagements was echoed here, with continued interest in multi-use courts and expanding pickleball facilities. Suggestions include converting existing tennis courts to multi-use courts to accommodate both sports or designing new courts that can be used for multiple activities, ensuring efficient use of space and resources in community parks. |
